Early findings on cannabis legalization in Colorado have found:

- The total number of marijuana arrests decreased by 46% between 2012 and 2014²
- Violent crime decreased 6% from 2009 to 2014²
- Colorado tax revenue from marijuana in 2015 was \$135,100,465² and nearly \$200 million in 2016³
- Opiate-related deaths decreased by approximately 33% in 13 states in the 6 years following marijuana legalization⁴
- In 2010 alone, states with legalized medical marijuana saw approximately 1,700 fewer opiate-related deaths than states without it⁴
- The legal marijuana industry in Colorado added over 18,000 new full time jobs in 2015⁵
- Colorado's unemployment rate was ranked 31st in the nation in 2012 at 7.9%. It now ranks among the top 5 in the nation at 3.0%⁵
